### What is Shmira?

Shmira is the ritual guarding, or watching over, of the body of the deceased person and comforting their soul from the time of death until burial. It is believed that during this time, the soul is hovering near the body.

A person who performs *shmira* is called a **shomer**, the one who watches. *Shmira* usually takes place in the funeral home. While sitting with the deceased, the *shomer* reads *Psalms* [*Tehillim*] or other inspirational materials to provide comfort to the soul.

At KBI, *shmira* is offered upon request. It is not uncommon for family members and friends of the deceased to coordinate or participate in *shmira* for a loved one. ### What is a Chevra Kadisha?

A **Chevra Kadisha**, "Sacred Society," is a Jewish volunteer organization composed of community and shul members that support families at the end of life. They prepare a deceased loved one for a proper Jewish burial with the utmost respect and dignity.

Historically, the Chevra Kadisha encompassed everything from visiting the sick (bikur cholim), guarding the body (shmira), preparing the body for burial (tahara), assisting with the funeral, and helping the mourners after the funeral.

Here at KBI, the Chevra Kadisha focuses on *tahara* and *shmira*. The KBI Chevra Kadisha was revitalized in the early 1970's.

## What is Tahara?

**Tahara** is the ritual washing when a loved one dies. At the funeral home, the Chevra Kadisha members gather to recite meaningful prayers and readings throughout the entire *tahara* process. The body of the deceased is gently washed, and the *tahara* water is poured to purify the body. The body is dressed in a white shroud (*tachrichim*) and then carefully placed in the casket (*aron*), a plain pine box.

The *tahara* is performed with the utmost respect and honor for the deceased, as the Chevra Kadisha physically prepares the body and spiritually comforts the soul.
