Yael Galinson Gamliel Final Project - Jewish Bikur Cholim & End of Life Kit

One of the holiest *mitzvot*, commandments, in our tradition is *bikur cholim*, visiting the sick. Being with those that are ill is an example of *g'milut chasadim*, acts of lovingkindness, and according to the Talmud, visiting a sick person is said to take away 1/60th of their pain. As a hospice volunteer and End of Life Doula, I have the privilege of accompanying those who are sick and nearing the end of their lives and caring for them and their loved ones. This work is holy and deeply meaningful.

Whether visiting someone who is ill with a non-life-threatening illness or visiting someone who has a terminal diagnosis, there are important ways to prepare and to show up mentally, spiritually, and physically. For my final project to graduate from the Gamliel Institute, I have put together a list of items to bring for such visits, and I am calling it a Jewish Bikur Cholim & End of Life Kit. The items on this list can be useful when performing the mitzvah of *bikur cholim*, when accompanying someone who is dying, and when caring for the body of someone who has just died. Where possible, I have included hyperlinks to the items, so they are easy to procure.

List of items to bring for Bikur Cholim¹:

- Personal Protective Equipment
 - Disposable gloves
 - Hand sanitizer
 - Masks
 - o Wipes
- Personal items for self-care
 - Water bottle
 - Snacks
 - Layers
 - Book to read
 - Journal
 - Reading glasses
 - Chargers for electronic devices
- Book of poetry/readings
 - Psalms it is traditional to recite psalms on behalf of those who are sick 1
